Western Regional Agricultural Stress Assistance Program (WRASAP)

Call for Translation Small Grants Proposals 2020-2023

Deadlines Funding Dependent: The last day of the quarter, 3/31/2021 – 7/31/2023

Background: Agriculture is widely known as a high-stress occupation. Stressors faced by farmers in the geographically large and culturally diverse Western region are many: unstable finances (high debt loads) and changing commodity markets whilst often carrying the pressure of multigenerational farm lineage, complex regulation and policy, adverse weather and climate change, and recent COVID-19 related stressors. Migrant and seasonal farmworkers experience their own set of stressors. While the stressors vary, the impact of extreme stress in agriculture reveals itself in the high occupational suicide rates of farmers and farmworkers. To meet these varied needs requires a network of trusted agencies, familiar with the agricultural needs of their communities and trained in behavioral health, equipped to offer targeted, culturally-appropriate stress reduction support, be it in moments of crisis (call line and suicide prevention trainings) as well as upstream interventions to lessen the impact of compounding stress. The Western Regional Agricultural Stress Assistance Program (WRASAP) is dedicated to improving the health and safety of those working in Western agriculture through multidisciplinary research, outreach, and trainings.

Funding Opportunity: The overarching goal of this WRASAP Small Grants Program is to facilitate and support translation activities that will directly improve farm stress and agricultural suicide prevention for the Western U.S. region. WRASAP partners have identified lack of translation of materials as a stressor and barrier to accessing services. Innovative proposals are encouraged, compelling arguments will support illustrating the need to fund these proposals.

- Examples of domains for translation projects in the WRASAP region include, but are not limited to, languages (i.e. Spanish, Russian, Mixteco, Chamorro, Tagalog, Chuukese, Kosraean, etc.) and cultures (i.e. farmer culture, farmworker culture, Hmong farmer culture, etc.).

WRASAP will accept proposals from student groups, community groups, NGOs and non-profit organizations who wish to propose and lead translation projects (i.e. provide in-person translation, translating a resource from English to a language to serve a minority farming population, translating a resource to include activities to make it interactive, making a resource culturally appropriate, etc) that relate to farm stress and agricultural suicide prevention for the Western states and territories of the United States of America (Alaska, American Samoa, Arizona, California, Colorado, Guam, Hawaii, Idaho, Micronesia, Montana, Northern Mariana Islands, Oregon, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Washington and Wyoming). This request for proposals is open to any student groups, community groups, NGOs and non-profit organizations who is interested in developing and carrying out a translation project that fits within this topic area. However, proposals from individuals who are affiliated with signed WRASAP partners will be prioritized.

Award: Funding will be awarded on monthly cycles for the 2020–2023 academic years. Requests may be up to \$10,000; most requests will be \$5,000-\$7,500. For requests above \$10,000, please contact grants@farmstress.us before submission deadline for additional criteria.

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Please note that although we have funding through September 2023 at our disposal for these mini-grant awards, future years' funding is solidified on a yearly basis from USDA, and thus is subject to change.

Funding will be allocated on an annual basis starting on September of the calendar year. Applicants are encouraged to apply early.

Eligibility: Any student groups, community groups, NGOs and non-profit organizations serving the Western U.S. may apply, however, preference points will be administered to the following grant partnering organizations: University of California Davis Extension and CA AgrAbility, Western Center for Agricultural Health and Safety (WCAHS), Health Education Council (CA), CommuniCare Health Centers (CA), National AgrAbility Project (NAP), University of Nevada Extension, Utah State University Extension, Colorado State University AgrAbility and Extension, University of Idaho Extension, Rocky Mountain Farmers Union (RMFU), Farm Aid, University of Alaska Fairbanks AgrAbility, American Samoa Community College, Montana State University Extension, University of Wyoming Extension, University of Hawaii Extension, Hawaii Dept. of Agriculture, University of Arizona Tribal Extension Program, University of Guam, College of Micronesia, Northern Marianas College, Oregon Dairy Farmers Association, Washington State Dairy Federation, Idaho Dairymen's Association, New Mexico State Dairy Extension, New Mexico State University, New Mexico State University Extension AgrAbility, Washington State Department of Health and Washington State University.

Key Dates: Proposals are due on the last day of the quarter, beginning on March 31, 2021 and ending on July 31, 2023.

Proposals will be reviewed, and a funding decision will be made within 30 days.

Please include the following in the application using the Small Grants Application Form (applications should not exceed 3 pages total):

- A description of the translation project, including the following sections: background, goals, approach, timeline, evaluation plan, budget (award limit includes direct and indirect)
- Two statements of relevance
 - Relevance of the translation project to the applicant's work
 - Relevance of the translation project to the aims and objectives of the WRASAP grant (see project background)
- A statement of sustainability
- How will the proposed translation project yield sustainable positive change
- Detailed budget including budget justification (please include whether additional funds from another source are being used to support the translation project)
- If translating an existing resource (i.e. workbook, article, brochure, etc.), please provide a signed letter of understanding from the copyright holder indicating permission to translate and distribute said materials.

**Graduate student and postdoctoral scholar applicants require an additional letter of faculty support*

Submission Instructions: Proposals are due on or before 5pm MST on the last day of the quarter.

Proposals will be accepted each quarter until July 31, 2023. Please send all applications materials in one pdf to grants@farmstress.us

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Review Criteria: Proposal reviewers will place high value on whether the proposed translation project will likely result in a significant impact to be made in the Western US Region vis-à-vis decreasing/coping with farm stress and/or a directly related issue. Proposals wherein the applicants' proposal will contribute to the goals of the WRASAP grant will be scored highly. Please indicate in the two statements of relevance how, specifically, the translation project will yield direct results that will benefit farmers, farmworkers and ranchers in the Western Region of the US.

Expectations of Successful Applicants:

Successful applicants are expected to submit two reporting documents:

- A 100-word description written in lay language on the proposed translation project for which WRASAP funds will be used. This description should be written in the third person. **This description is due two weeks after the translation project has started.**
- A 500-word impact/reflection statement that describes the impact of the completed translation project had (i.e., was a new collaboration formed? Were trainings translated? Quantity of materials distributed. Which populations were reached? How many people were reached?) This reflection should be written in the third person. **This reflection should be written 6 months after the translation project has concluded, and submitted no later than 8 months after the conclusion of the funded translation project.**

Reporting requirements will be articulated in the award funding contract.

Awardees will be expected to acknowledge WRASAP and USDA NIFA in publications, presentations and outreach that result as a direct consequence of the funding.

If, due to COVID-19, the funded project is modified (e.g., a face-to-face conference moves online), the awardee is expected to notify the grantor at grants@farmstress.us of the change (and associated cost change) immediately.

In an effort to bring meaningful resources to farmers and farm workers in the Western Region, all products, materials, data and results from Small Grant efforts are expected to be shared openly with WRASAP network and made available for use/adaptation as appropriate.
